THE ORIGIN OF THE CHESTERFIELD HISTORICAL SOCIETY

We recently talked to Chesterfield Historical Society cofounder Don Howitt about the origins of our organization. He told us how in March of 1993, George Furton placed an ad in the Voice informing that anyone interested in the history of Chesterfield and the Bay Area was invited to attend a meeting at the township offices the following week. The reason for the meeting was to discuss

forming a "Chesterfield Township Historical Society." There were approximately ten people attending the first meeting. The society was formed from this small group and Don was elected to be the interim president until an election could be held. At the next meeting he was elected president and held the office for the next eleven years! The basis of the organizational structure was put

together at this second meeting of our organization. Following this, in 1993, Don had several discussions with thentownship supervisor Jim Pollard about securing a piece of land from the township to develop an historical park. They originally tried to get the strip of land on the left side of the entrance road to the township offices, but they were very happy and accepted when offered the property on the right

side of the offices instead.
In 1996, George
F. and Don had
many conversations with the
Odrobina family
and they made a
decision to donate to the society the little red schoolhouse that had
originally been

Discussion was held on receiving a loan from George Deeby for the purpose of moving them. The approximate cost will be \$6000. 
Origin of the Chesterfield Historical Society (cont'd)

Chesterfield District #1 schoolhouse, also known as the Weller school. It had most recently been a real estate office for Odrobina Realty, still in its original Gratiot and 22 Mile Road location. George and Don worked out the particulars to get the school over to the historical property. The society later received donations of two bells, two horsehead tieup posts, and many books, paper artifacts, and much more. The

society is presently working with the Chesterfield Public Library to preserve, store, and make available to historians these artifacts and others that have been donated since then. The first building that was going to be taken to the property was another schoolhouse that had also been used as a township meeting hall. Unfortunately, this building went up in flames the weekend before it was going to be moved.

Therefore, the society was very happy to get the Odrobina building. After the building was moved to the historical area, Mary Jane Howitt and Don

worked out several

grants and the society held several money makers to help rehabilitate the school. The school has now been refurbished and has been open to the public many times since then, with the next public event planned for September 23, 2006. Don has received a special commendation from the township for his work with the founding of the historical society.

PROGRAM NEWS

Bernard Pearl will be the guest speaker for the first joint meeting of the Anchor Bay Genealogical Club and the Chesterfield Historical Society. This will be at the regular time of the September meeting, Tuesday, September 5th, at 7 pm. However the meeting location will be the Chesterfield Township Public Library at 50560 Patricia Avenue- near 23 Mile and Gratiot. (Look for the library signs.) We are pleased to have Bernard Pearl doing our first joint program. The subject is one that we think will be of interest to both groups-the cemeteries of Macomb Countyl

A little bit of information about Bernard Pearl in his own words:

I have completed 18 books and maps on cemeteries in northern Macomb Co and 4 cemeteries in St Clair Co. At this time there are 37,600 names in my computer database, about 19,000 who are buried in local cemeteries and the rest are their family members or are buried in other cemeteries. My studies cover names, location, birth date and place, death date and place, marriage date and place, military, Masons, father, mother and family tree info. I also have another database with 73,240 people that includes my family and work that I did for research for my church. As far as myself, I have prepared books on my military life, my Ancestors, my family name, a book on my personal life, starting as a child through adulthood, and books for members of my family for all of the previous listings. The books contain pictures, personal data, family trees, and many individual stories. My family dates back to Kings of France, England, Scotland and Jerusalem, who are connected to the royalty of many other countries and times. My relatives and ancestors have served in Vietnam, Korea, World Wars 1 & 2, Civil War, Revolutionary War and were active in many old world wars and go back to being active in the Crusades. I currently am a cousin to living people who were or are, President of Chrysler do Brazil, and a director of Volkswagen, Mr. America and Mr. Universe, a Commander of Pensacola, Florida Air Base and he worked in the Pentagon, a CEO to a current large Corporation and other successful people in life. As far as myself I was an tool designer and engineer for many small companies and also for Chrysler Corporation, both in the United States, Mexico and South America. I served in the US Army in the Unites States and Europe and enjoy history, genealogy, gardening, travel and the study of religious topics.

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
ODDS and ENDS

- The schoolhouse was broken into the weekend of June 10th. The annex door was kicked in and the panels on the door between the annex and the school was smashed so the intruders could crawl into the school room. It appears no damage occurred, some of the desks were turned over and the piano was uncovered.
- George Deeby announced that a 6-month extension has been granted to the Friedeman farmhouse so as to remove historical artifacts.
- A display shelf was purchased to display items in the log cabin.
- Our board liaison John Grivas secured storage space at the police station for the historical society to store large items.
- The footings are in, at the historical village location, for the two Trinity buildings to be moved.
- Michael Dixon gave a presentation on how automobiles were influenced by small boat engines at the June meeting. He brought along the three books he has written on the subject.

Inch by inch, old carriage house moves to new spot



CHESTERFIELD TOWNSHIP - A weathered wooden carriage house had its own police escort Monday as it made its way down the road to its new home at a township park.

The carriage house was part of a collection of buildings on the grounds of the Trinity Museum and Library, a popular spot for Chesterfield residents in the 1950s. Most of the buildings on the site at Sugarbush and Cotton roads are replicas built about 50 years ago to commemorate the original 1800s-era settlement.

As he directed traffic to make way for the carriage house, Chesterfield Township Police Lt. Chuck Verschaeve recalled visits to the Trinity Museum and Library. Verschaeve would buy penny candy and hear stories told by Bernard Trinity, an upholsterer whose family owned the settlement. "It brought back old memories; said Verschaeve." It was a great time back then. You had to use your imagination:

The carriage house was moved to a new spot on township grounds on Sugarbush north of 21 Mile. Township Historical Society members arranged for the move; today, the slightly larger blacksmith building is expected to follow the same route. "We are very happy to get the opportunity to get these buildings;' said George Deeby of the historical society. Crews from C & A Construction of Berville in St. Clair County spent nearly five hours working to secure the building and prepare it for the three-tenths of a mile trip south on Sugarbush. Workers first placed large boards on the inside of the building, and then used jacks to raise it.
